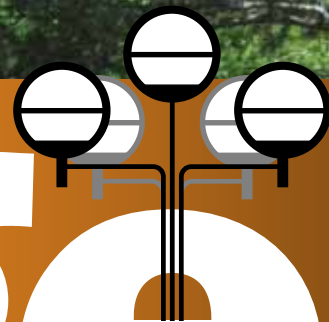

## Graduates honored at May 9 Commencement

### Utica Auditorium ceremony includes presidential investiture

As friends and family gathered to honor the Class of 2009 at SUNYIT's 35th annual spring commencement May 9, the State University of New York's Officer-In-Charge, John J. O'Connor, administered the oath of office to SUNYIT President Bjong Wolf Yeigh.

SUNYIT's new president has been on the job since July 1, 2008. In February, Yeigh announced that funding for an inauguration week and a formal ceremony would be reallocated to student, faculty and staff development, and that his installation would take place at Commencement.

More than 370 candidates for undergraduate and graduate degrees were eligible to take part in the ceremony at the Utica Memorial Auditorium. The keynote speaker was former National Transportation Safety Board member John Goglia. A post-event reception for graduates and guests was held in the SUNYIT Campus Center.

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# Nanotech Partnership Will Put SUNYIT on the Map

## Millions in investment will ‘transform’ campus

It was a unique day in SUNYIT’s history, a “day of firsts” as one participant put it. Wednesday, July 15, 2009, saw SUNYIT President Wolf Yeigh and Assemblywoman RoAnn Destito sharing a stage in the Cayan Library with the Governor, Assembly Speaker, SUNY Chancellor, and several other noteworthy officials. The participants came together to announce a Computer Chip Hybrid Integration Partnership (CHIP) between SUNYIT and the University at Albany’s College of Nanoscale Science and Engineering funded by New York State and nanotechnology industry giants IBM and SEMATECH. It was, as Gov. David Paterson and SUNY Chancellor Nancy L. Zimpher said, “An epic moment for SUNYIT and the Mohawk Valley.”

For SUNYIT, several participants said, tens of millions of dollars in funding for a state-of-the-art, high-tech business incubator/technology accelerator, a “clean room” and the national and international attention the campus will receive from the industry and the general public will “transform” the campus. For the Mohawk Valley, the announcement signals the arrival of a new industry to fuel a long-awaited economic rebirth. The goal is the attraction and retention of small and medium size nanotechnology companies; officials said the project is expected to create as many as 475 supplier and contractor jobs in the Mohawk Valley alone – with the potential for many more in the long term – and expand the nanotechnology industry throughout upstate New York.

“We are linking the highly successful nanotechnology partnership at UAlbany with SUNYIT to bring the nanotechnology industry and high-paying jobs into the Mohawk Valley,” Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver told a crowd of more than 200 at the news conference. “We are encouraging university-industry collaboration and the establishment of upstate New York as a premier location for nanotechnology research, development and manufacturing.”

Silver and others pointed to the campus property west of Edic Road – the Marcy Nano-Center at SUNYIT – as a logical beneficiary of the SUNYIT-UAlbany partnership. More than \$225 million in investment by the state and industry partners IBM, SEMATECH and Intel, officials say, will help attract a nanotech manufacturing tenant for the 300-acre site.

For Assemblywoman RoAnn Destito, long a supporter of SUNYIT, the announcement fulfills a goal to help the institution realize its unique mission and full potential in ways that will support economic development for the entire region.

“[It’s] the culmination of several years of discussion and planning that I have been working on with a number of key partners,” Destito said. “Most importantly, the \$35 million dollars in funding Speaker Silver and I have secured for this project will establish the first regional, cross-university Research and Development nanotechnology facility in upstate New York.”

The SUNYIT-UAlbany partnership will establish two centers – one for nanotech

research and development at UAlbany, the other – the Computer Chip Commercialization Center (CCCC) – at SUNYIT for the assembly and integration of “system-on-a-chip” systems developed at the UAlbany center. Destito and others who spoke credited Alain E. Kaloyeros, senior vice president and chief executive officer of CNSE at UAlbany, with a key role in establishing the partnership along with President Yeigh.

And what does the future hold for SUNYIT beyond the millions in investment and the alphabet soup of acronyms?

“We don’t have all the answers yet – but together we will begin exploring a whole new range of possibilities to further strengthen and develop this institution,” President Yeigh wrote in a recent blog post. “Given the size and scope of our partnership with UAlbany, IBM, SEMATECH and Intel, it would be hard to overstate the importance and the positive impact this will have on SUNYIT.”



# New Provost to Oversee Academic, Student Affairs

SUNYIT's new provost is no stranger to SUNYIT. Esther G. Bankert, Ph.D., R.N., has been a member of the SUNYIT nursing faculty since 1980. She served as interim dean of the School of Nursing & Health Systems from 2003-2005 and as dean from 2005 until her appointment as provost took effect July 1, 2009.

"Esther has demonstrated a commitment to academic quality and the student experience at SUNYIT during her nearly three decades of service here," said Wolf Yeigh, president. "She is uniquely qualified to be our provost, and I look forward to working with her."

The result of a nationwide search in spring 2009, Bankert's selection was the culmination of a process that involved the entire campus. She succeeds longtime faculty member Rosemary Mullick '83, who had served as interim vice president for academic affairs since 2005.

Bankert is excited about making a difference in the position, for students and for SUNYIT. "As a faculty member, dean, and now provost, I am committed to improvements for our students," she said. "It's appropriate that the first building of the four SUNYIT is constructing in the next few years is called a 'Student Center,' because everything we do here revolves around students."

As she began her first year in the position, Bankert said she was keeping a number of priorities in mind. "I expect my first year will be focused on learning all the programs, departments and services so I can better articulate what our needs are. Also, the very first meeting I held was on assessment – a priority since a Middle States report is due next year. When we look at assessment, we can examine not only the areas in which we need improvement but also find out and showcase what we do well." Other priorities include strategic planning for SUNYIT and getting to know the key players at SUNY System Administration in Albany.



Bankert's career is replete with nursing education and community service, scholarly activity, and leadership roles on and off campus. Many of her family members have an interest in nursing as a career as well: daughters Justine and Amy are in SUNYIT's nursing program and Denise plans to apply. Bankert and her husband, Norbert, also have two sons: "Nobby," a civil engineer, and John, a corrections officer.

Building on her experience in nursing education and administration, Bankert says being dean has given her opportunities to prepare for the provost's position. "As dean I networked with the other schools [Arts & Sciences, Business, and Information Systems & Engineering

Technology] and worked with the other deans. As provost, I can build on that experience with a better, more detailed understanding of the programs and services we provide."

Bankert looks forward to being part of President's Yeigh's team. She says she admires "his energy, his fresh approach. I really look forward to working with him. I think we complement each other."

# New SUNY Chancellor Visits SUNYIT Campus

## Students, alumni, faculty, staff greet Nancy L. Zimpher

SUNY Chancellor Nancy L. Zimpher spent the day on the SUNYIT campus June 11, as part of a commitment to visit all 64 SUNY campuses in her first 100 days in office. The Chancellor met with President Wolf Yeigh and campus leaders, toured the campus, and greeted more than 150 guests at a Kunsela Hall reception. Among those in attendance were Assemblywoman RoAnn Destito and Oneida County Executive Anthony Picente.

The visit attracted significant media attention, including a 30-minute session with the Observer-Dispatch editorial board and a live interview with WKTV-TV broadcast from the reception. Also during the visit, the Chancellor addressed two SUNY groups meeting in Lake Placid – SUNYCUAD (Council for University Advancement) and SUNYCAP (College Admissions Professionals) – via videoconference from the president's conference room in Kunsela Hall.

"The great advantage SUNYIT has is its uniqueness; it serves the whole state...it is the center of technology," Zimpher told the Observer-Dispatch. "It's a real jewel in our crown."

Zimpher was Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee from 1998-2003 and served as the president of the University of Cincinnati from 2003-2009 before agreeing to lead SUNY. During her SUNYIT visit, she referred several times to creation of a SUNY-wide strategic plan, aimed at "making SUNY a public higher education model not only for the nation but the world." The planning process will be a model for statewide collaborations – gathering suggestions, ideas and comments from thousands of stakeholders through town hall meetings, web conferences and other outreach. The plan is expected to be completed in the spring.

Zimpher and Yeigh toured the campus, visiting future construction sites for SUNYIT's four funded buildings: a student center, field house, residence hall, and advanced technology center. They also discussed the Marcy

NanoCenter at SUNYIT, 300 acres of campus property west of Edic Road being marketed for nanotechnology or other high-tech development by Mohawk Valley EDGE.

"We're thrilled that our new Chancellor came to campus to see first-hand why SUNYIT is an important part of the Mohawk Valley and New York State," Yeigh said. "Chancellor Zimpher's dynamic leadership will ensure the continued growth and success of SUNYIT and the entire SUNY System."

At the end of the day, Zimpher said her first visit to SUNYIT was a success.

"We had great interaction...I have spoken with the president, with the vice presidents, with deans of the schools; I've met students, I've met members of the College Council...this was just exactly what we dreamed it would be."

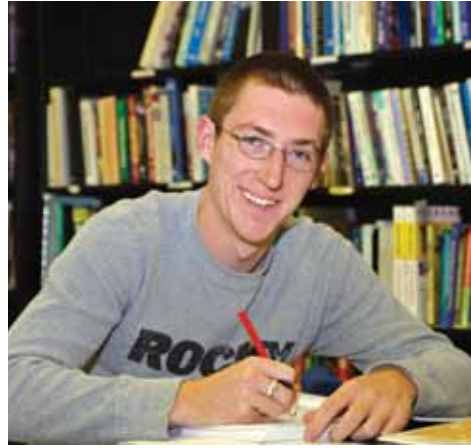


## International Exchange: SUNYIT Students Visit Greece

## Getting Started

### President Yeigh begins work

The early weeks on the job were busy for SUNYIT's new president, Wolf Yeigh. Assemblywoman RoAnn Destito joined more than 130 faculty, students, staff, College Council

members and other friends of SUNYIT at a Kunsela Hall reception. After officially beginning work July 1, the president also spent considerable time meeting with community and business leaders off campus.

### New freshmen arrive

About 200 soon-to-be freshmen and their parents spent two days getting to know the faculty, staff and campus in mid-July. The annual orientation program prepares incoming freshmen for the start of their first semester—and for the next four years. Members of the Class of 2012 will see a lot of changes over the course of their college career. As President Yeigh told students and parents, "It's unbelievable the amount of construction you'll see on campus during your four years here."

### Prospective students come to campus

Annual fall and spring Open House programs brought record numbers of prospective students to campus. Increasing awareness of SUNYIT across the state has made Open House even more popular as a starting point for those considering a college choice.

## Watch us Grow!

### Record enrollment

A 26-year enrollment record: In the fall 2008 semester, 2,891 students were enrolled including 207 freshmen, 374 new full-time transfer students, and 62 full-time graduate students.

### Fourth new building

The academic year began with the news that SUNYIT was planning another new building: a \$23.5 million residence hall. President Yeigh's announcement to students, faculty and staff brought to four the number of buildings to be constructed over the next several years. The others are: \$13.6 million student center, \$20 million field house, and a \$27.5 advanced technology center.

### First of four groundbreakings

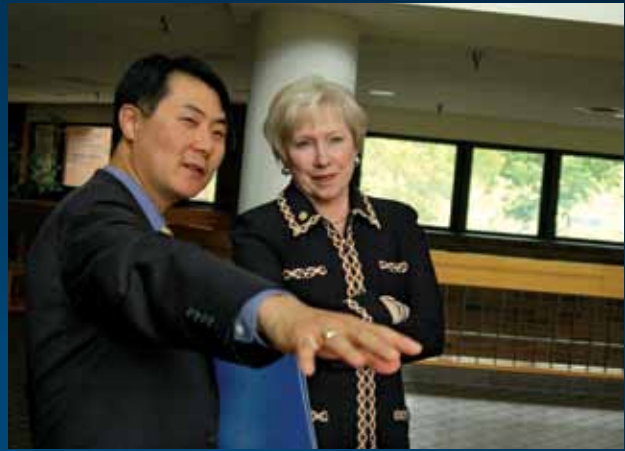

## Achievement

### AACSB International accreditation announced

AACSB International – The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business formally approved AACSB accreditation for SUNYIT, a distinction awarded to less than 5% of the world's business schools and about 400 of the 3,000 schools of business in the U.S. President Yeigh made the official announcement in January. "AACSB accreditation shows our students, prospective students and other stakeholders that the quality of our business programs is internationally recognized," said Stephen Havlovic, dean of the School of Business.

AACSB International is the premier accrediting agency of collegiate business schools and accounting programs worldwide. AACSB International accreditation, a specialized, non-governmental review process, takes

place over a period of at least five years. Accreditation represents the highest standard of achievement for business schools worldwide. Institutions that earn accreditation confirm their commitment to quality and continuous improvement through a rigorous and comprehensive peer review.

SUNYIT's School of Business offers undergraduate degrees in accounting, business, finance, and health services management. Graduate programs offered are: MBA in health services management, MBA in technology management, M.S. in accountancy, M.S. in health services administration. All graduate programs and the bachelor's program in health services management are also available online.

## Faculty & Staff

### 'Best Book' award

*Web Campaigning*, co-authored by Steve Schneider, professor and interim dean of the School of Arts & Sciences, and Professor Kirsten Foot of the University of Washington, was selected as the winner of the Doris Graber Best Book Award by the Political Communication Section of the American Political Science Association. The award is given to "the best book published on political communication in the last ten years." Published by MIT Press, *Web Campaigning* documents the dramatic expansion of the use of the Web in U.S. political campaigns over the course of the last several election seasons, and examines the evolution of campaigns' Web practices.

### Faculty member's book featured

SUNYIT faculty member Veronica Tichenor's book, *Earning More and Getting Less: Why Successful Wives Can't Buy Equality*, was featured in a CNN.com report entitled "When she earns more than he does." Tichenor's book looks at the power dynamics in marriages where wives earn substantially more than their husbands. The book was previously featured in the National Post, a Canadian national newspaper.

### History book receives award

*From the Mills to Marcy*, the first published history of the State University of New York Institute of Technology (SUNYIT), received a Gold Hermes Award from the Association of Marketing and Communication Professionals. The book was authored by John Swann '02, director of public relations & communications, with information drawn from archival documents, historical news accounts, an oral history project, and interviews with a number of persons involved in the early days of the college. The Hermes Creative Awards 2008 Competition is an international competition for creative professionals involved in the concept, writing and design of traditional and emerging media.

### Statewide honor for website

SUNYIT received a top award from the State University of New York Council for University Advancement (SUNYCUAD), SUNY's professional organization for institutional advancement personnel. The "Best in



Category" honor for "Student Recruitment Websites" went to gsbh.sunyit.edu, a website for prospective freshmen. The award was presented at SUNYCUAD's 2008 conference at the Fashion Institute of Technology in Manhattan.



### Winning year for Wildcats

The SUNYIT athletics program capped a successful transition from the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) to the North Eastern Athletic Conference (NEAC) by taking home the NEAC President's Cup for the top men's program in the conference, while also being named the fourth-best women's program and placing second overall among the NEAC's nine member institutions. The 2008 switch from the SUNYAC to the NEAC immediately showed positive results, as each of SUNYIT's five fall sports had record-breaking seasons. The success continued when the men's basketball team had the best season in program history—and its first-ever appearance in the NCAA Division III Tournament.

## Community Outreach

### Excelsior Scholars Project brings high-achieving students to campus

Funded by a \$30,000 NYS Education Department grant, the SUNYIT Excelsior Scholars Project gave math and science learning challenges in a college setting to a group of 20 high-achieving 7th graders. Students chosen through a highly competitive process were taught by SUNYIT faculty and two high school teachers, assisted by SUNYIT students. Topics included: shift ciphers and other secret codes, and tracking prey and predator population trends.

### Technology Showcase draws hundreds to Campus Center

The 8th annual Mohawk Valley Technology Education and Pre-Engineering Showcase included middle and high school student technology displays and competitions, and business and industry displays. The celebration of students and technology brings students together with the many interconnected groups of people who enthusiastically use technology in education, business and industry.

### President Yeigh addresses engineering group

President Yeigh was the keynote speaker at the Mohawk Valley Engineers Executive Council (MVEEC) 59th annual awards banquet, marking National Engineers Week in February. MVEEC, which represents engineering, scientific, and technical societies, presented individual and organizational awards honoring the year's technical achievements of people, organizations, and companies in the Mohawk Valley.

## Stewardship and support

### Inauguration dollars redirected to fund student success, faculty & staff development

In a break with tradition, President Yeigh decided to forego a formal inauguration ceremony and use the money budgeted for the event to support student, faculty and staff needs. Yeigh said money budgeted for inauguration events including a formal ceremony would supplement donations to two new development funds he has established: the President's Opportunity Fund for Student Success, which supports retention and recruitment of high-achieving students and continued student success, and the President's Opportunity Fund for Faculty and Staff Development, which makes funding available to qualified individuals seeking help with professional development opportunities. The two funds combined totaled more than \$90,000 as of June 30, 2009. "The feedback I've received from students, faculty and staff has been positive," Yeigh said. "Their comments confirm my belief that number one, the money should go where it's needed more and number two, what better place to mark the formal installation of a new college president than commencement—an event where celebrating student success is the first order of business."

### \$20,000 M&T Bank/Community Foundation grant to fund scholarships

SUNYIT received a \$20,000 grant from the M & T Bank/Partners Trust Bank Charitable Fund, a donor-advised fund of The Community Foundation of Herkimer & Oneida Counties, Inc. The scholarship for transfer students will honor Peter A. Spina, SUNYIT's interim president from 2004 to 2008, who previously served as president of Monroe Community College in Rochester, N.Y. Awards will be made to eligible full-time transfer students from Oneida and Herkimer counties.

### Workforce Development Institute grant helps launch FLL tournament

SUNYIT entered the second "practice" year to become an official First Lego League (FLL) tournament sponsor for the Central New York region with the help of a \$13,000 grant from the Workforce Development Institute. Lego competitions encourage students ages 9-14 to engage in creative learning, working in teams and using hands-on technology. Other supporters of the FLL project included: BAE Corporation, Black River Systems, Dolphin Technology, Homogeneous Metals, Lockheed Martin and the Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties.



## Building Relationships

### 'Geek Week' celebrates love of technology

SUNYIT's Alumni and Student Associations sponsored a unique celebration of "geek culture." Designed to kick off the spring semester, January's "Geek Week" was the second such campus-wide event, encouraging all students, faculty, staff, and alumni to take part in a wide variety of activities with geek-related themes. Student and Alumni Association organizers decided to make Geek Week an annual event after their research showed no similar celebration of geek culture at any other college or university in the country.

### Students organize second animé convention

For the second time, SUNYIT played host to an animé convention. The October event, "SITACon 2008," was a project of the student Animé Club. Animé, a term derived from the Japanese word for "animation," is an internationally popular form of hand-drawn and computer-assisted animation. In conjunction with the convention, a group art exhibition was staged in Kunsela Hall's Gannett Art Gallery. The convention itself featured video displays, exhibits, live gaming, and panel discussions.

### Student clubs sponsor Abraham House fundraiser

Three SUNYIT student organizations organized a benefit for Utica's Abraham House, which offers end-of-life care to the terminally ill and their families. Students in the psychology, sociology, and nursing clubs raised \$12,000 at the sixth annual "Dinner, Dance & Romance," at Hart's Hill Inn in Whitesboro. All proceeds from the March event went to the not-for-profit Abraham House, which provides services at no cost and relies completely on the community for donations of goods and financial support, as well as volunteers to aid in the delivery of services.

## Alumni

### Paying tribute, honoring achievement

The late Robert Ingalls '77, a community leader, and Jeffrey Ledda '87, who worked on the Academy Award-winning film *Titanic*, were among those SUNYIT alumni honored at the Alumni Association and Wildcat Hall of Fame Awards in September. Ingalls, a criminal justice alumnus, worked in law enforcement and government and was a former director of the Utica Boilermaker Road Race. Ledda, an electrical engineering technology graduate, assisted in the production of *Titanic's* opening scenes, working inside a submarine to guide a camera-equipped robot in and around the famous wreck.

### Finding success in game design

SUNYIT graduate James Silva '05 '07 was the subject of an Associated Press feature describing how he and other independent game designers are turning a lifelong interest in computer games into successful careers. The AP story was published in the summer of 2008 and appeared on many websites including CNN.com. Silva was one of four winners of Microsoft's Dream-Build-Play contest, and was awarded a contract to publish his game "The Dishwasher: Dead Samurai" on Xbox Live Arcade. Originally from Clifton Park, N.Y., he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in computer science.



## Economic impact on the region

SUNYIT is a growing economic force in the heart of New York State. With more than 250 employees and an operating budget of more than \$19 million, SUNYIT has an estimated economic impact on the community and the region of more than \$75 million a year. \$100 million in funded campus construction projects will add to the campus's positive economic influence on the Mohawk Valley and Central New York.

### College Council

Each campus of the State University of New York is advised by a 10-member council. Nine members are appointed by the governor to serve six-year terms; the tenth member is a student elected annually by the student body on each campus. The College Council is entrusted with broad powers of advice and counsel. The members of the council are concerned with all major institutional policy decisions, setting academic standards, budget review, and all manner of decisions that affect students' well-being.

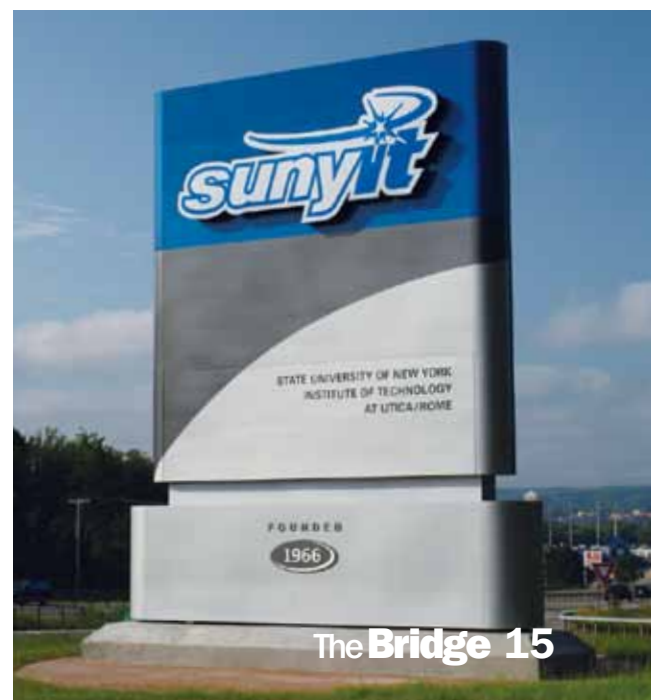


# New Look for Campus Entrances

Over the summer, crews installed a two-ton monument sign featuring the SUNYIT logo at the main entrance to campus at Horatio Street and Rte. 12, and similar, smaller signs at the Mulaney Road and Edic Road entrances.

The completed structure at the Horatio Street entrance is 24 feet high and 18 feet wide. Made of aluminum in SUNYIT's blue-and-gray school colors, it replaces the original campus entrance sign in place since 1985. Workers used a crane to fit the monument's three parts over a concrete-and-steel-reinforced supporting structure.

At night, the sign's SUNYIT logo will be lit by hundreds of Light Emitting Diode (LED) lamps, using less energy and lasting longer than fluorescent or other traditional lighting systems. The entrance signs are part of a capital improvements project that will include new directional signs across campus.

## Wildcats Cap Successful Transition to the North Eastern Athletic Conference with NEAC President's Cup

SUNYIT capped its successful transition from the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) to the North Eastern Athletic Conference (NEAC) by taking home the NEAC President's Cup for the top men's program in the conference, while also being named the fourth-best women's program and placing second overall among the NEAC's nine member institutions.

"Our first year in the NEAC was truly an amazing one," said SUNYIT Athletics Director Kevin Grimmer. "Our student-athletes, coaches and teams responded with outstanding results. We're very proud of sponsoring the best overall men's sports program and our second place finish for overall intercollegiate program and look forward to the challenge of next year."

The switch from the SUNYAC to the NEAC last fall immediately showed positive results for SUNYIT, as each of the institution's five fall sports – men's and women's cross country, men's golf, men's and women's soccer and women's volleyball – had record-breaking seasons. The success continued into the winter season, where the men's basketball team had its best season in program history. Led by head coach Kevin Grimmer, who was named the NEAC Men's Basketball Coach of the Year, the team finished with a program-best 23-7 overall record and the won the school's first NEAC Championship. This led to the program's first-ever appearance in the NCAA Division III Tournament, where the team stunned heavily-favored Elms College with an 85-77 victory in the first round.

Leading the team during its sensational season was the trio of sophomore David Golembiowski (Barneveld, N.Y./Holland Patent), senior Ajani Edwards (Brooklyn, NY/Brooklyn Tech) and junior Diloo Brown (Harlem, N.Y./Technical Careers Institute). Golembiowski led the team in points (19.9) and blocks (2.3) per game and was named the NEAC Player of the Year, while also being selected to NEAC All-Conference First Team, the ECAC Division III-Upstate All-Star First Team and the D3Hoops.com All-East Region Second Team. Throughout the course of the 2008-09 season, the 6-foot-7 sharpshooter also earned three

NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week awards, an ECAC Division III-Upstate Player of the Week award and a selection on the D3Hoops.com Team of the Week. Edwards capped off a tremendous four-year career with a sensational senior season, as he was second in the nation in assists per game (8.1) and third in steals per game (3.6), and finished as SUNYIT's all-time leader in career assists (526) and steals (203). Edwards' fantastic play throughout the season earned him a spot on the NEAC All-Conference Team, in addition to a NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award and an ECAC Division III-Upstate Player of the Week award. Brown also had a fantastic season, as he was twice selected as the NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week and also won the NEAC Tournament's Most Valuable Player award, averaging 19.7 points and 6.3 rebounds per contest during the three-game tournament.

While the men's team used a potent offense to achieve success this past season, the women's basketball team accomplished its feats through tenacious defense, finishing the year ranked fifth in the nation in both field goal percentage defense and three-point field goal defense en route to a 14-12 overall record and an appearance in the NEAC Tournament. Sophomore Tamara Williams (Rome, N.Y./Rome Free Academy) was selected to the NEAC All-Conference Second Team and also won a Student-Athlete of the Week award after leading the team in points (12.3), rebounds (10.8) and blocks (2.3) per game, while fellow classmate Taylor Topping (Bronx, N.Y./Preston) was selected to the All-Conference Third Team after averaging 11 points per contest. Freshman Caitlin Cottell (Red Bank, N.J./Red Bank Catholic) also won a Student-Athlete of the Week award.

The men's and women's swimming teams looked like they were ready to handle the jump from club teams to the varsity level after each having a record-setting year, with the men's team breaking 18 school records and the women's team breaking eight. Sophomore Jeff Quesnel (Brewerton, N.Y./Paul V. Moore) broke an astounding seven individual school records over the course of the season and was also in-

cluded in five team records, while Teresa Huang (Brooklyn, N.Y./HS for Leadership and Public Service) also broke an incredible seven individual school records. Both swim teams will compete in the NEAC as a varsity sport in the 2009-10 season.

Two SUNYIT winter sports that are not sponsored by the NEAC – women's bowling and men's volleyball – also showed progress this year. Senior Kristen Koenig (Albany, N.Y./Hudson Valley) was consistently among the top bowlers at each Invitational that SUNYIT participated in and led the Wildcats to a second place finish, four third-place finishes and a top-five finish this season. The men's volleyball team, which is in just its second year of competition, showed it has a bright future through freshman Ryan Meller (Eden, N.Y./Eden Central), who led the team in kills (350) and serve aces (31), and junior Alex Rahmel (Cornwall, N.Y./Cornwall), who finished fifth in the nation in digs per game (3.42).

Many accomplishments were achieved by each of the school's three spring sports as well.

Head baseball coach Kevin Edick was selected by his peers as the NEAC Coach of the Year, while seven of his student-athletes were named to the NEAC All-Conference Team. Junior Chris Fratini (Syracuse, N.Y./Westhill) earned a spot on the All-Conference First Team after leading the Wildcats in batting average (.387), slugging percentage (.523), hits (43), total bases (58), home runs (2) and triples (3), while sophomores Kevin Burr (Oriskany, N.Y./Oriskany) and Ethan Marr (Roslyn, N.Y./Roslyn) and freshman Patrick Baker (Ronkonkoma, N.Y./Connetquot) were selected to the All-Conference Second Team. Senior Vinny Brescia (Utica, N.Y./Proctor) wrapped up his tremendous four-year career with a selection to the All-Conference Third Team and finished as SUNYIT's all-time leader in hits (129), total bases (149) and at-bats (416), while being second all-time in

RBI (65), runs scored (75) and stolen bases (25). Joining him on the Third Team was sophomore David Golembiowski and senior Justin Marsden (Whitesboro, N.Y./Whitesboro), who finished with 103 career hits to place second all-time in that category. In addition, senior Jake Squillace (Amsterdam, N.Y./Fulton Montgomery CC), who led the team with 25 RBI, took home a NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award during the season.

First-year head softball coach Jessica Skelton saw two of her student-athletes make the All-Conference Third Team: freshman Amanda Pratt (Rochester, N.Y./Rush-Henrietta) and sophomore Amanda Myers (Boonville, N.Y./Adirondack). Pratt led the team in at-bats (78) and was tied for the team lead in runs scored (16) and doubles (6), while Myers was a team co-captain and started in all 26 Wildcat contests. Additionally, Juleah Vedder earned a NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award and finished the year as the team leader in batting average (.338), slugging percentage (.541), hits (25), home runs (3), RBI (20) and total bases (40).

Rounding out the SUNYIT spring sports was men's golf, which continued its string of strong performances from the fall by winning the first-ever Wells College Invitational and finishing in fifth place at the NEAC Championships. Senior Jesse Smith (Binghamton, N.Y./Chenango Forks) also continued his dominance, winning a second NEAC Student-Athlete of the Week award and being named to the NEAC All-Conference First Team.

Beginning in the 2009-10 academic year, the NEAC will welcome the College of Saint Elizabeth (Morristown, N.J.) and Penn State University - Abington (Abington, Pa.) as full members, joining SUNYIT, Cazenovia College (Cazenovia, N.Y.), Keuka College (Keuka, N.Y.), Penn State University - Berks (Reading, Pa.), Penn State University - Harrisburg (Middletown, Pa.), SUNY Cobleskill (Cobleskill, N.Y.), Wells College (Aurora, N.Y.) and Wilson College (Chambersburg, Pa.). Associate members include the University of Dallas (Irving, Texas), Medaille College (Buffalo, N.Y.), SUNY Oneonta (Oneonta, N.Y.) and Rutgers - Camden (Camden, N.J.). In 2010-11, the NEAC will be at 12 strong when it adds Morrisville State College (Morrisville, N.Y.) and Gallaudet University (Washington, D.C.), which is the leading university worldwide dedicated to the education of deaf and hard of hearing individuals through education in American Sign Language and English.



## Women's Volleyball Team Honored with NEAC Sportsmanship Award

The SUNYIT women's volleyball team has been honored with the 2008-09 North Eastern Athletic Conference Team Sportsmanship Award. The award is given each year to a team that "has consistently demonstrated good sportsmanship and ethical behavior in its daily participation in intercollegiate athletics, and has exemplified the values of respect, caring, fairness, civility, honesty, integrity and responsibility, while also demonstrating good citizenship outside the sports setting."

The Lady Wildcats, led by head coach Becky Fletcher, earned the award for continuously demonstrating good citizenship through their participation in multiple events both on and off campus. The team, which consisted of 10 student-athletes, participated in both the SUNYIT "Team Violette" Breast Cancer Walk and the American Cancer Society's 13th annual "Making Strides Against Breast Cancer" walk this past fall. The Wildcats were among hundreds of SUNYIT faculty, staff and students that took part in the "Team Violette" walk and the 3,400 people that participated in the "Making Strides" walk, which supports the American Cancer Society in its lifesaving research, prevention and support programs for thousands of patients and their families. Sporting bright pink "Support the Courage" shirts, the women's volleyball squad helped "Team Violette," a campus-wide group, raise over \$2,700, while the "Making Strides" walk generated a total of \$225,000.

"It was a great feeling to go out there and help the cause and be aware of what is going

on in our community," said senior and team captain Hillary Pundt, who was named to the NEAC All-Conference First Team. "It would be great to see the volleyball team make this an annual event and continuously support breast cancer awareness."

In addition to these events, the team organized a function with the local humane society and spent a day caring for orphaned dogs and cats. Additionally, the team helped out with the girls' volleyball clinic last summer and continued their relationships with the attendees long after the clinic was over, as they kept in touch with them throughout the team's season. On campus, the team volunteered to help with freshman move-in day, giving up their free time to help carry luggage and greet the new faces on campus.

In 2006-2007, the NEAC Student-Athlete worked together to create and foster a new sense of sportsmanship throughout the conference. They created the NEAC sportsmanship slogan ("Stay Classy NEAC!") and statement which is endorsed throughout the conference:

"The student-athletes of the North Eastern Athletic Conference uphold the responsibility of sportsmanship by demonstrating leadership, positive attitudes, and respect so that all collegiate participants will maintain the integrity and character of the conference. We strive to achieve these ideals through a commitment to fair and honest competition."

# Head Coach of Women's Soccer Appointed

SUNYIT has appointed Tyler Renaud as the head coach of the women's soccer program. "Our women's soccer program will benefit immediately from Tyler's impressive coaching credentials and recruiting experience," said SUNYIT Athletics Director Kevin Grimmer. "He promotes the perfect blend of academic and athletic performance for his teams and we're excited to have him join the SUNYIT community. Tyler will also launch our new women's lacrosse program as soon as the new field house/turf field projects get underway."

Renaud inherits a Wildcat women's soccer team that won a program-best eight games last season and made an appearance in the North Eastern Athletic Conference quarterfinals.

"I strongly believe we have a legit shot at the NEAC Championship," Renaud said. "With last year's squad being 8-9-1 overall, I think the returning players we have and the incoming recruits will help put us over the .500 mark, so we definitely have the capacity to have a winning record this upcoming season and make some noise in the NEAC Tournament."

Renaud joins SUNYIT boasting an impressive coaching resume. Prior to becoming a Wildcat, Renaud served as the head coach for both women's soccer and women's lacrosse at Norwich University (Northfield, Vt.) from 2005 to 2008. Renaud led the women's soccer team to a GNAC Tournament appearance during all four of his seasons with the team, and most recently led his squad to the 2008 GNAC regular season and tournament championships, which earned them an automatic bid into the NCAA Division III

National Soccer Tournament. He also led the women's lacrosse team to a GNAC Championship in 2008 and an appearance in the ECAC New England Region Lacrosse Tournament that same year, while making it to the semifinal round of the New England Women's Lacrosse Tournament in 2007. His accomplishments earned him the 2008 GNAC Women's Lacrosse Coach of the Year award and the 2007 New England Women's Lacrosse Coach of the Year award.

Prior to Norwich, Renaud began his coaching career at Cayuga Community College (Auburn, N.Y.), where he was the head coach for women's soccer and women's lacrosse from 2002 to 2005. He led the women's soccer team to the Mid-State Athletic Conference Championship in 2003 and 2004 and appearances in the NJCAA Region III Soccer Tournament in both of those years as well. This women's lacrosse team won back-to-back Mid-State Athletic Conference Championships in 2004 and 2005, while taking home the NJCAA Region III Lacrosse Championship in 2004 and making it to the Region III Championship game in 2005. He also won multiple awards while at Cayuga, including the MSAC Women's Soccer Coach of the Year in 2003 and 2004, the 2003 NJCAA Region III Women's Soccer Coach of the Year, the 2004 MSAC Women's Lacrosse Coach of the Year, the 2004 NJCAA Region III Women's Lacrosse Coach of the Year and the 2005 NJCAA District C Women's Lacrosse Coach of the Year.

Renaud also prides himself on the fact that his squads from both Norwich and Cayuga were on



the NSCAA All-Academic Team in 2003, 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2008, which is something he will continue to strive for at SUNYIT.

Renaud is also a certified coach in both soccer and skiing for the Special Olympics, while also being certified as a US Lacrosse Official and a USSF Official and holding NSCAA Regional and National Diplomas. He has also held the title of head coach for the U16 Girls Far Post Soccer Club (Burlington, Vt.), the U17 Boys Essex United Soccer Club (Essex, Vt.), U17 Girls Nordic Premiere Soccer Club (Burlington, Vt.) and the U18 Boys Olympic Soccer Club (Syracuse, N.Y.).

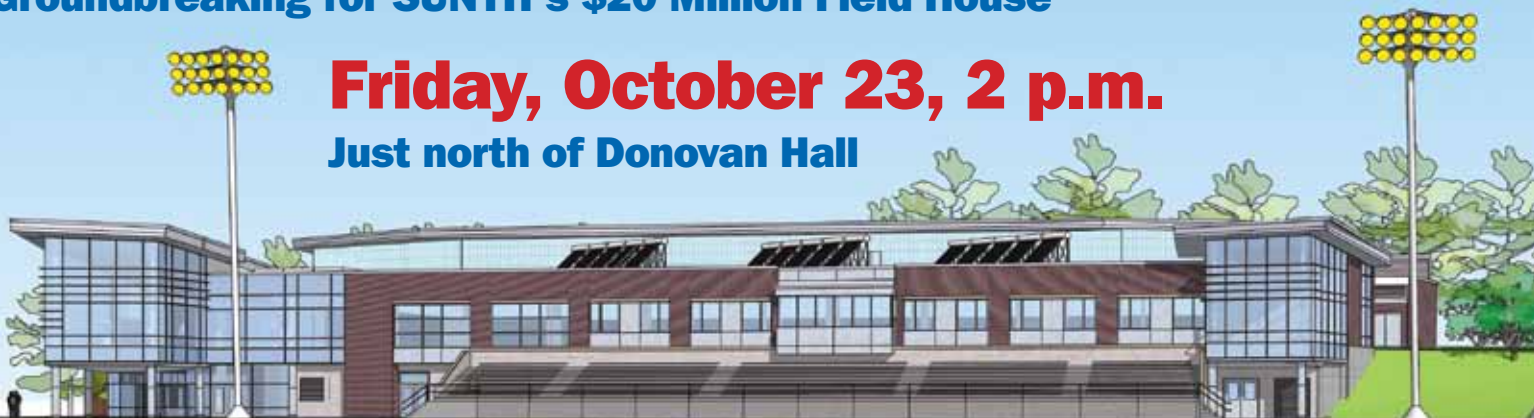
